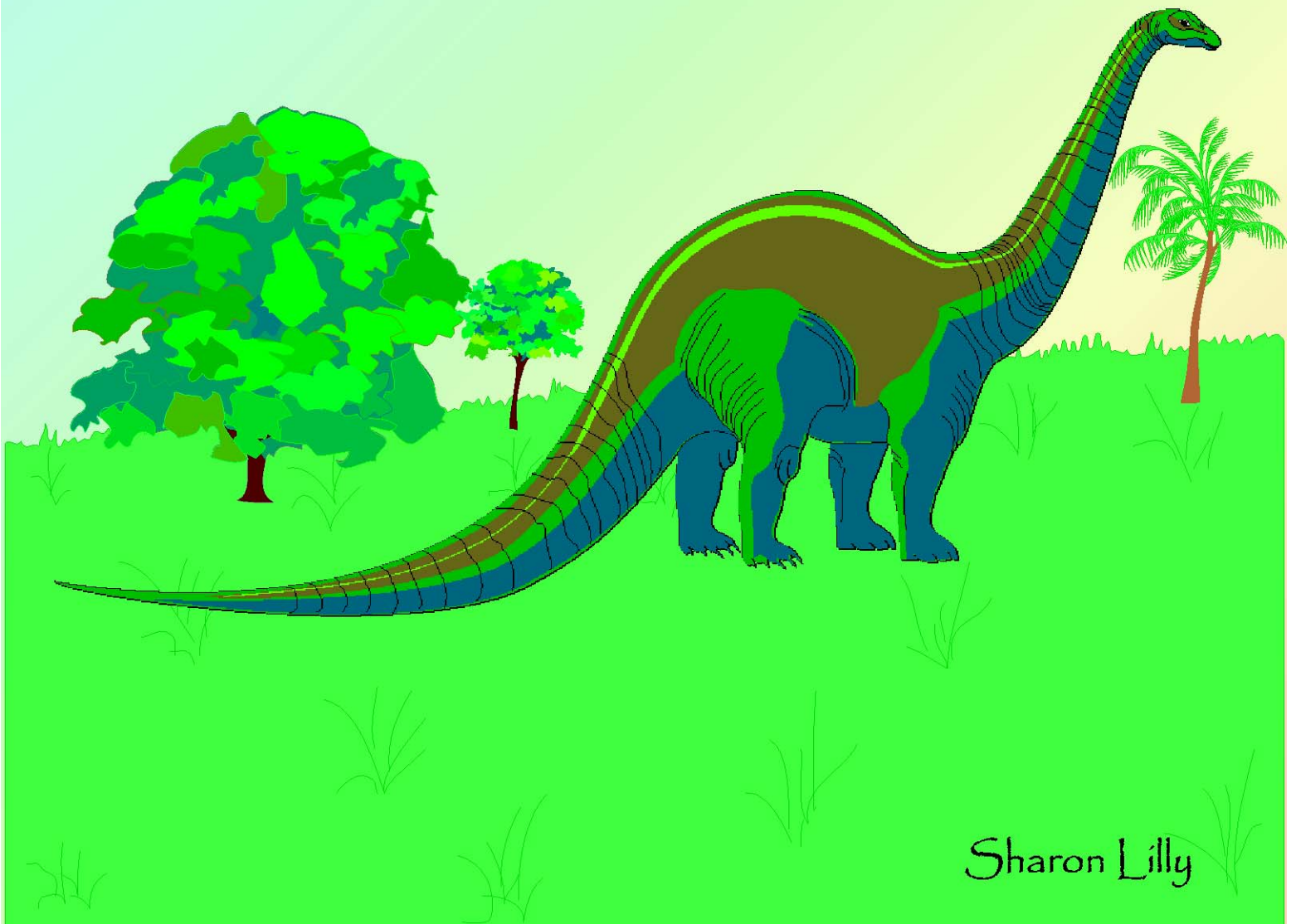

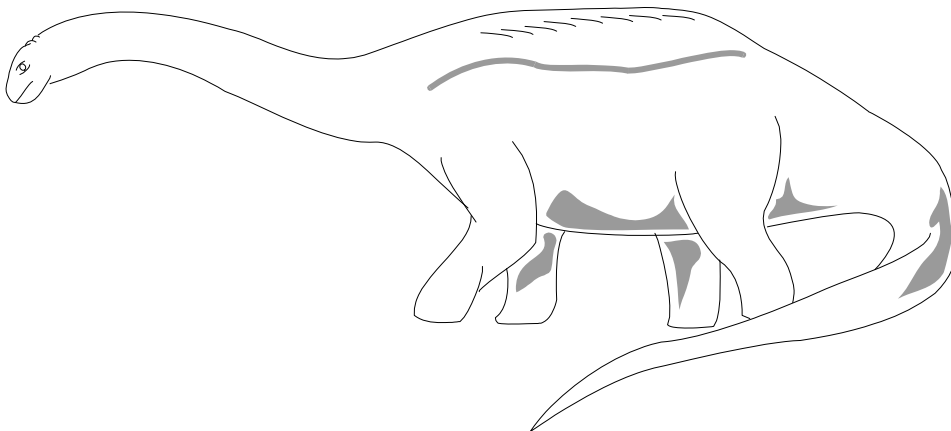

How did Dinosaurs get here?

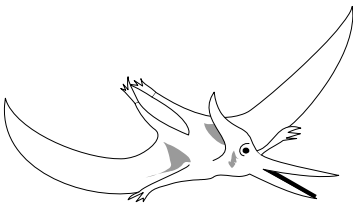
The bones of many dinosaurs have been found. We know they existed.

Many people have different ideas about them. But God tells us in His Word, the Bible, exactly where and when they began. The Bible talks about dinosaurs in several places.



Genesis 1:1 says: "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth."

Genesis 1:24 and 25 say: "And God said, Let the earth bring forth the living creature after his kind, cattle, and creeping thing, and beast of the earth after his kind: and it was so."



"And God made the beast of the earth after his kind, and cattle after their kind, and everything that creepeth upon the earth after his kind: and God saw that it was good."

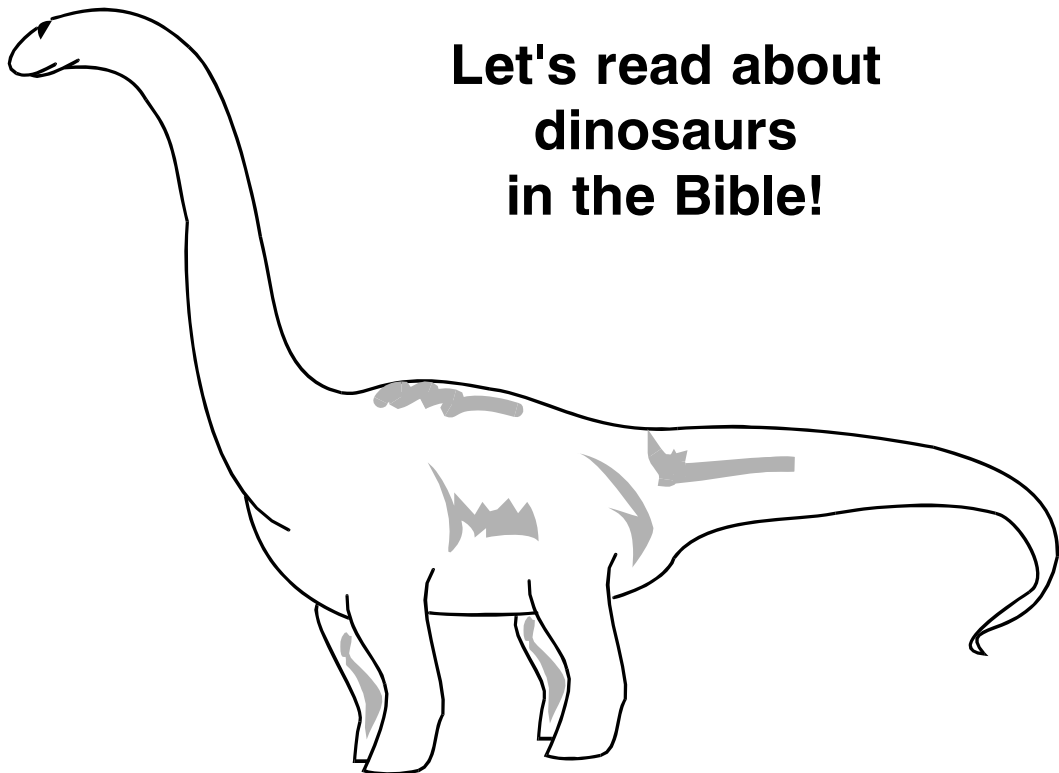
That means God made them. He made them in the beginning - about 6,000 years ago.



What does the Bible say about dinosaurs?

The word "dinosaur" is not in the Bible, because the word had not been invented yet.

It does use the word "dragon", "leviathan" and "behemoth".

Job 40:15-18

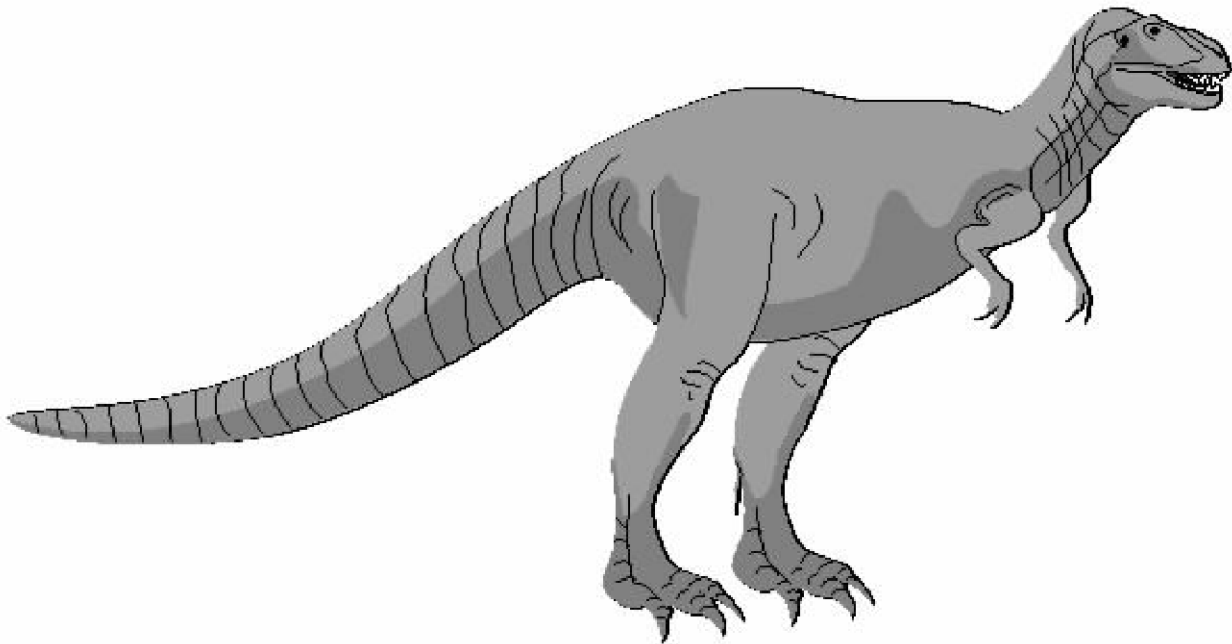
Behemoth

"He moveth his tail like a cedar; . . .

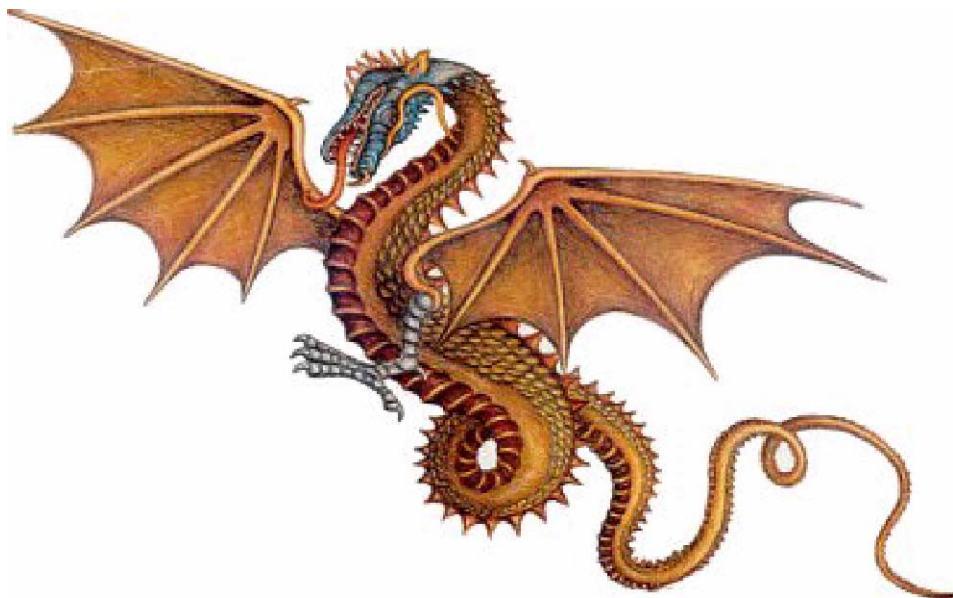
"His bones are as strong pieces of brass;
his bones are like bars of iron."



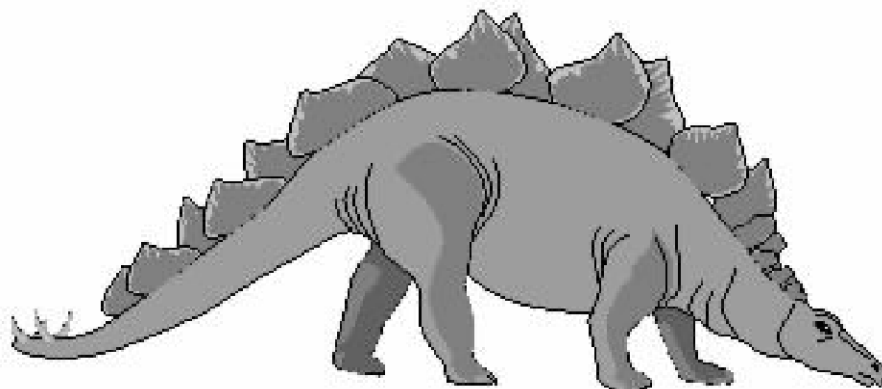
Job 41

Leviathan

- 1 Canst thou draw out leviathan with a hook?
or his tongue with a cord which thou lettest down?
- 2 Canst thou put a hook into his nose?
or bore his jaw through with a thorn?
- 3 Will he make many supplications unto thee?
Will he speak soft words unto thee?
- 4 Will he make a covenant with thee?
Wilt thou take him for a servant for ever?
- 5 Wilt thou play with him as with a bird?
Or wilt thou bind him for thy maidens?
- 6 Shall the companions make a banquet of him?
Shall they part him among the merchants?
- 7 Canst thou fill his skin with barbed irons?
or his head with fish spears?
- 8 Lay thine hand upon him,
remember the battle, do no more.
- 9 Behold, the hope of him is in vain:
shall not one be cast down even at the sight of him?
- 10 None is so fierce that dare stir him up:
who then is able to stand before me?
Whatsoever is under the whole heaven is mine.



- 11 Who hath prevented me, that I should repay him?
Whatsoever is under the whole heaven is mine.
- 12 I will not conceal his parts,
nor his power, nor his comely proportion.
- 13 Who can discover the face of his garment?
Or who can come to him with his double bridle?
- 14 Who can open the doors of his face?
His teeth are terrible round about.
- 15 His scales are his pride,
shut up together as with a close seal.
- 16 One is so near to another,
that no air can come between them.
- 17 They are joined one to another,
they stick together, that they cannot be sundered.
- 18 By his sneezings a light doth shine,
and his eyes are like the eyelids of the morning.
- 19 Out of his mouth go burning lamps,
and sparks of fire leap out.
- 20 Out of his nostrils goeth smoke,
as out of a seething pot or caldron.
- 21 His breath kindleth coals,
and a flame goeth out of his mouth.
- 22 In his neck remaineth strength,
and sorrow is turned into joy before him.
- 23 The flakes of his flesh are joined together:
they are firm in themselves; they cannot be moved.
- 24 His heart is as firm as a stone;
yea, as hard as a piece of the nether millstone.
- 25 When he raiseth up himself, the mighty are afraid:
by reason of breakings they purify themselves.
- 26 The sword of him that layeth at him cannot hold:
the spear, the dart, nor the habergeon.
- 27 He esteemeth iron as straw,
and brass as rotten wood.
- 28 The arrow cannot make him flee:
sling stones are turned with him into stubble.
- 29 Darts are counted as stubble:
he laugheth at the shaking of a spear.
- 30 Sharp stones are under him:
he spreadeth sharp pointed things upon the mire.
- 31 He maketh the deep to boil like a pot:
he maketh the sea like a pot of ointment.



Dragons

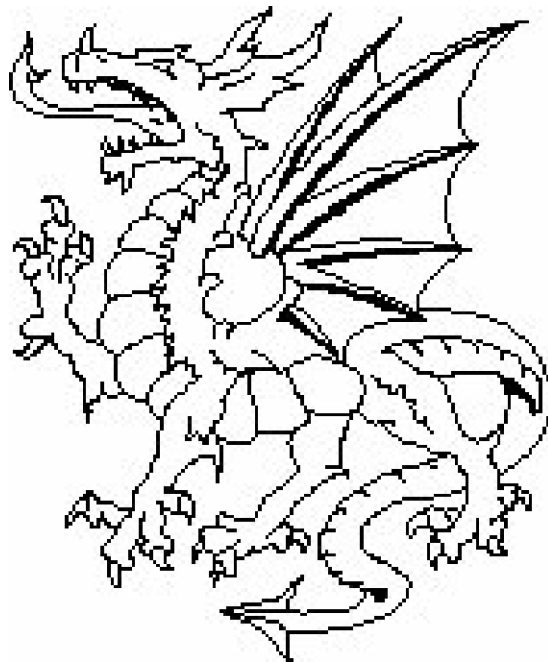
"Out of his nostrils goeth smoke,
